The European Year aims to make cultural heritage accessible to all by removing social, cultural and physical barriers. The Year also aims to engage local communities and help people to rediscover how much of our heritage is shared. Putting our common values, shared history and heritage in the spotlight can contribute to and reinforce a sense of belonging in Europe, and ultimately bring us closer together.

The initiative has four main components:

SPECIAL EYCH EDITION OF THE EUROPEAN HERITAGE DAYS

Every year, over 30 million people of all ages enjoy access to rarely opened sites and unique events across Europe as part of the **European Heritage Days** (EHDs). In 2018, this popular initiative will help to reinforce the European Year of Cultural Heritage. Three new activities will be implemented from 2018:

• A 'Call for European Heritage Stories' to collect testimonies of how communities understand the European dimension of their local heritage;

- A 'European Heritage Makers Week' to inspire children and youth to explore their surroundings, discover the European dimension of their local heritage and share their stories¹;
- 'Funding trans-border projects', to enable the realisation of small-scale cross-border projects.

COMPONENT II-

SPECIAL EYCH EDITIONS OF THE EU PRIZE FOR CULTURAL HERITAGE/EUROPA NOSTRA AWARD THE EUROPEAN HERITAGE LABEL

The EU Prize for Cultural Heritage/Europa Nostra Awards recognises best practices in the conservation, management, research, education and communication of Europe's shared heritage. The 2018 award ceremony will take place in June during a high-level European Heritage Summit in Berlin, organised by Europa Nostra, the German Cultural Heritage Committee and the Foundation of Prussian Cultural Heritage.

The European Heritage Label (EHL) celebrates heritage sites that symbolise European ideals, values, history and integration. In 2018, a touring exhibition of European Heritage Label sites will be launched and a high-level award ceremony for nine new labelled sites organised.

COMPONENT III-

SHARING HERITAGE, DIGITALLY

COMPONENT IV-

REMOVING BARRIERS AND INCREASING ACCESS TO CULTURAL HERITAGE

Physical, social and geographical barriers hindering participation to cultural heritage will be tackled through two different projects:

- The European Union **Access City Award** (ACA) will recognise cities that have done outstanding work in making their cultural heritage accessible.
- The **WeAre#EuropeForCulture** project, will promote heritage among hard-to-reach groups and will hold pop-up exhibitions in venues such as retirement homes.
- The EuropeanaTech 2018 conference will discuss how best to share and embrace technologies that allow us to share our cultural heritage digitally.
